Tricia also asks if anyone can ID this aster, fantastic colour but name unknown. (Later identified as Symphiotrichon 'Helen Picton').




Jean Marshall asks if anyone knows the variety of this Helenium


# **PHOTOS FROM YOUR GARDENS**
