Judy mentioned that this is a genus of nearly 30 species of shrubs in the witch hazel family, Hamamelidaceae, They are native to eastern Asia with the majority of species endemic to China but with some also in Japan, Korea, and the Himalayas.



HINTS AND TIPS

In the last KIT I shared Jeans observation that squirrely were eating her Hellebore flowers. Angela McCreery got in touch with a good solution. She said use chilli powder as a repellent, it is safe for other wildlife apparently, do not apply on a windy day, reapply after rain and you can get big bags of it in the Asian food section of some supermarkets. Angela discovered this trying to deter whatever was eating her bearded Iris leaves. She says it does work and thinks it keeps the foxes and cats at a distance too suggesting that most wildlife has good scent and hazard detection systems and so just keep their distance.
